# Sean Quinn, 25, New Dorp

Ouinn leads the line at Chadwicks in Bay Ridge, Since graduating from New England Culinary institute five years ago, he's completed kitchen tours in Manhattan's comorate catering scene, at Vida Restaurant in Stapleton, Richmond County Country Club and ever-so-briefly at short-lived Grotto Steakhouse, formerly of Grant City, Quinn's credo: Simple flavors make quality incredients stand well on their own. He opines that heavy sauces have no place on a plate and says, "If you're going to eat a piece a meat. you want to taste the meat."



# Emily Gear, 28, West Brighton

Gear was just 24 when she grabbed the reins. of the Garibaldi-Meucoi Museum, the Italian culture treasure chest in Rosebank. The museum had only one employee (herself) and one permanent exhibit. Four years later the executive director/curator has increased the institution's budget by 70 percent, bringing it up to \$200,000, adding festivals, more school programs and more language classes. She made that happen by getting the museum its own 500(C)3 federal tax exemption status. "It sounds boring, but it means a lot to an organization." she says. "It means our pathways to funding are much broader." Also an accomplished painter. Gear brought home a medal from the Florence Bieniele of International Art in 2005.

# Elijah Bullock, 24, West Brighton

You may have caught his recent act on MTV's "Wild "N Out" or his appearances on "BET Comic View" and HBO's "Def Comedy Jam." Twice a month he co-hosts - with co-founder JP Justice - the "Grown Folk Comedy" series on the Island. Things you get in Manhattan, we're trying to bring to Staten Island for a cheaper price," says Bullock, who works the circuit at Caroline's, Stand-Up New York and the Laugh Factory. "Grown Folk" drops on the last Saturday of the month at the Cup in Stapleton and on the first Saturday of the month at Dominick's Panini King in Dongan Hills.
